Martin says, "I hope that this booklet encourages people to look beyond the boundaries, and perceived shame, of receiving a dementia diagnosis. Most importantly, my wish is that people can find fulfilment in a life with dementia and be able to find some sort of activity that they can enjoy: many studies have shown that using the brain is helpful for one's general physical health, and this does not stop being the case if one has dementia. Focus on what you can do and keep striving."
